PRESIDENT Kate Caithness

Scotland's Kate Caithness is the first female president of the World Curling Federation and the first female president of any Olympic winter sports federation.

First elected president of the WCF in April 2010 and re-elected without opposition in 2012 and 2014, Caithness has been involved with the sport of curling since the 1980s. As a member of Scotland's Royal Caledonian Curling Club, she went from playing the game to putting something back into the sport in the late 1990s. She served as president of the RCCC Ladies' Branch in 1997-98, then became an RCCC representative to the World Curling Federation.

Since 2000, Caithness has been the driving force behind the WCF's development of wheelchair curling. She was on the team that created the first World Wheelchair Curling Championship and was instrumental in the sport's inclusion at the 2006 Paralympic Winter Games in Turin, Italy.

From 2005 to '09 Caithness was an elected member of the International Paralympic Committee's five-person Sports Council Management Committee and she served on the Paralympic Games Committee from 2006 to '09.

Caithness was elected vice-president of the WCF in 2006 and served two two-year terms under former president Les Harrison.

In March 2011, Caithness was appointed to the Olympic Program Commission, responsible for reviewing and analyzing the sports, disciplines and events program, as well as the number of athletes in each sport, for the Summer and Winter Olympics.

Married and the mother of two sons, Caithness became a grandmother in 2008. She spends her free time with family and, when she has a chance, curling and playing golf at her home club in Edzell, Angus, where she was the Lady Captain from 2002 to '04.

THE WORLD CURLING FEDERATION

The World Curling Federation is the recognized governing body of curling in the world.

The WCF's first formal constitution was approved in 1967 under the original charter of the International Curling Federation in Perth, Scotland. The constitution was significantly adjusted in 1982, when the federation was declared independent from Scotland's Royal Caledonian Curling Club, to which its original constitution had been tied. In 1991, the official name was changed to World Curling Federation. Further significant changes were made in 1994.

The WCF has a four-part mandate:

- To represent curling internationally and to facilitate the growth of the sport through a network of member associations
- To formulate rules of the sport of curling for world competition and all other competitions approved by the WCF and to further the interests of world curling
- To conduct world curling competitions
- To provide co-operation and mutual understanding among member associations and to unite curlers throughout the world

The new chair of the Canadian Curling Association's board of governors is Marilyn Neily of Pleasantville, Nova Scotia. A native of Bridgewater, Nova Scotia, and graduate of

Acadia University's School of Physical Education and Recreation, Neily moved in 1982 to Frobisher Bay in the Northwest Territories — now Iqaluit in Nunavut — where she began a 16-year teaching career at the Gordon Robertson Education Centre.

Before being elected to the CCA board in 2010, Neily was an active club development participant who was involved in everything from icemaking and coaching to fundraising and administration. Through her job as Territorial Special Advisor for Sport, she worked for several years with the Nunavut Curling Association, helping to build a sustainable territorial sport organization. When Nunavut first hosted a national championship — the 2009 Canadian mixed — Neily played an active role in hosting teams from across Canada. Active in competitive sport as an athlete, coach, administrator and official, Neily spent most of her professional career in the field of sport development and administration. In recognition of her many contributions, she was awarded the 1994 Outstanding Educator Award, the 1997 Ruth Inch Memorial Volunteer Contributor to Sport Award and in 2011 she was named to the Sport and Recreation Council of Canada's honour roll. In 2013, she was awarded the Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal for her significant and sustained contributions to making physical activity a priority within her community and country through the national office of ParticipACTION.

Neily demonstrated her dedication, determination and commitment to a healthy lifestyle by climbing to the summit of Africa's highest mountain, Mount Kilimanjaro, in 2013. Her extensive sport administration background includes leadership roles with the Canada Winter and Summer Games, Western Canada Summer Games, the Arctic Winter Games and VANOC 2010.

Neily retired from public service in 2011. Married to Tim, Neily has two children; Jonathan lives in Iqaluit and Colleen in Charlottetown.

CCA ADMINISTRATION

The Canadian Curling Association's head office is located in Orleans, Ontario, at 1660 Vimont Court. In addition, the CCA retains Warren Hansen under contract from his office in Vancouver as director of event operations and Al Cameron as director of communication and media relations from his Calgary office. The CCA has numerous event offices across the country and several dozen contractees who help administrate and manage the organization in support of the national office. It also retains a local marketing office and personnel in Winnipeg and a national marketing office and personnel in Toronto.

Greg Stremlaw Greg Stremlaw works out of the CCA's national office in Orleans, Ontario, and has just completed his seventh year as chief executive officer.

Before joining the CCA in 2007, Stremlaw was the CEO and executive director of Chicopee Ski & Summer Resort in Kitchener, Ontario, where he had been employed since 2002. Before that, he was for six years director of sport services for luge and bobsleigh for the Calgary Olympic Development Association (now WinSport Canada), which included his role as race chairman/race director for numerous international events, including the 1999 Viessmann Luge World Cup, the 2001 Skeleton World Championship and Women's Bobsleigh Championship.

He holds a master's degree in sports management from the University of Miami in Coral Gables, Florida, a master's of business administration from the University of Maine in Orono, Maine, and a bachelor of arts in commerce from the University of Western Ontario in London, Ontario.

Stremlaw's board experience includes the Canadian Ski Council, KidsAbility Centre For Child Development and the Conestoga College Program Advisory Committee. He is currently the chairman of the Canadian Sport Tourism Alliance, co-chair of the Canadian Winter Sport Caucus, an international delegate to the World Curling Federation and a Canadian Olympic Committee session member.

An athlete of note, Stremlaw has been active in many sports, including soccer and track and field, and was a member of the United States hockey team program.

Married to Wendy, Stremlaw has two children, Kristin and Michael. The family leads an active lifestyle that includes coaching and participating in competitive soccer, baseball, hockey and synchronized swimming.

Awards Of Achievement



The winner of the 2014 Canadian Curling Association Award of Achievement is Jack Bowman of Victoria.

The CCA achievement awards are presented annually to recognize individuals who have

contributed significantly to curling in one of four areas — builder, technical development (instructor, coach, official, ice technician), marketing and media.

A longtime curling volunteer, Bowman served as chair of the CCA's board of governors in 2010-11, capping a five-year stint on the board.

Bowman's volunteerism began in Toronto in the mid-1980s, when he served a term as president of the Weston Golf and Country Club. When Bowman moved to Victoria in 1996, he quickly got involved with the Victoria Curling Centre, serving as president for two terms while also serving as the club and zone representative for the Pacific Coast Curling Association for five years. He later served as executive director of the PCCA and in 2004 was awarded a life membership, which was recognized by Curl BC a year later when the three B.C. curling associations merged into one.

Bowman continues to be active behind the scenes; he has presented CCA Business of Curling seminars to curlers and clubs in the four western provinces as well as Northern Ontario since 1998 and has worked with curling facilities in British Columbia to help them apply for Community Gaming Grants — work that resulted in \$540,000 being awarded to 27 B.C. curling centres during the 2012-13 season.

FORD HOT SHOTS

The Ford Hot Shots celebrated its 20th season at the 2014 Scotties Tournament of Hearts and Tim Hortons Brier.

When the Ford Motor Co. of Canada became part of international curling in 1995 as title sponsor of the Ford World Curling Championships, it introduced an opportunity for Hearts and Brier curlers to participate in individual skills competitions known as the Ford Hot Shots. in most corners of the curling world. While some countries have individual curling competitions, Ford Hot Shots is the first skills competition at major curling events that pits the abilities of championship curlers against one another's.

In each round of competition, each curler delivers six skill-testing shots — hit and stay, draw the button, draw the port, the raise, hit and roll and double takeout.

Each shot is worth a maximum five points, with the final location of the shooter being







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World Financial Group Continental Cup

The competition includes mixed doubles, singles, men's and women's team games, and mixed, men's and women's skins.

The World Financial Group Continental Cup brought together 12 of the best curling teams in the world — six representing Team World, six representing Team North America — facing off in a unique competition in January 2014 in Las Vegas, Nevada.

A total of 60 points was available from the competition's four events — mixed doubles, singles, team and skins. When the competition was completed, Team North America was declared the winner with 35 points and awarded the Continental Cup trophy.

MIXED DOUBLES

Each side picked six doubles teams. A doubles team consists of two throwers — one man and one woman — who also provided the sweeping.

Points

One point was awarded for each doubles game won. In the case of a tie, each team received half a point. Six games were played and a total of six points awarded.

Rules

- Scoring was counted as in normal curling.
- Each game was eight ends. Ties were not broken.
- Each team was given 24 minutes of thinking time per game.



It's high fives all around after Team North America clinched the 2014 Continental Cup title. It all came down to finalday skins matches with 30 points up for grabs and the Americans didn't disappoint, winning four of six games for a total of 17.5 points. The final score was Team North America 35, Team World 25.

• Each team threw five rocks per end. The player delivering the first rock of each end also delivered the last rock of the end; the player throwing the second rock delivered the third and fourth rocks of each end. This rotation could change from end to end and was simply determined by the player who delivered the first rock of each end.

 No rock could be removed from play until after the third rock of each end and any rocks it may have displaced came to rest.

• Two stationary rocks were positioned by the officials at the start of each end. One rock bisected the centre line, approximately eight feet in front of the house (the exact position of this rock was determined by the chief umpire before the competition, depending on ice conditions); the other was positioned at the back of the button so that it bisected the centre line and touched the tee.

• Before the start of each end, one team had an option. The team with the option had its choice of having its rock placed as a guard or having the rock positioned in the house behind the button. If the guard was chosen, the opponent's rock was positioned in the house or vice versa.

 The team with the rock out front as a guard delivered first and the team with the rock in the house delivered second (had last rock in the end).

• After the first end, the team that lost the previous end had the option.

• If an end was blanked, the team that blanked forfeited the option for the next end.

SKINS COMPETITION

Points

Five points were available for each skins game. The first six ends of each game were worth half a point and the last two were worth one point each. Six skins games were played and a total of 30 points awarded.

Rules

- Each game consisted of eight ends.
- Each team was allocated 32 minutes of thinking time per game. If a team exceeded the allotted time, the game was stopped. Each team retained the points already earned in the game and the remaining points were forfeited to the non-violating team.
- Each end was referred to as a skin. To count a skin when a team had last rock, it had to count at least two points. When a team didn't have last rock, it had to steal at least one point to count a skin.
- If a team scored only one point when it had last rock, it not only lost the hammer, but the end was carried over, which meant the points at stake were carried over to the next end.

• If an end was blanked, a carryover took place and the team that blanked the end forfeited last rock to its opponent. If the final end of a skins game resulted in a carryover, the two teams determined who would claim the carryover points by selecting a player from each team to deliver one rock to the button with sweeping. The team that had last rock in the last end shot first.



The award winner is selected annually by competitors in the World Women's Curling Championship as the player who best combines playing ability with sportsmanship. 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



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THANKS FOR THE MEMORIES

The curling community will always remember five great champions of the sport who died in the past year. Each played an integral role and made significant contributions to curling in Canada and worldwide.



Dr. Clyde Opaleychuk

Dr. Clyde Opaleychuk passed away at his home in French River, near Sudbury, Ontario, on September 21, 2013. He was 71 years old.

Opaleychuk graduated from the University of Toronto's

Faculty of Dentistry and opened his practice in Sudbury in 1969. He had a love of baseball and was an avid Toronto Maple Leafs fan but his passion was curling. He was on the board of directors of the Sudbury Curling Club for many years and also was secretary-treasurer of the Northern Ontario Curling Association.

Opaleychuk was elected to the Canadian Curling Association's board of directors in 1979 and served as president in 1984-85. The recipient of the Ray Kingsmith Executive of the Year Award in 1993, Opaleychuk was a life member of the Sudbury Curling Club and was inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in 1986.



Anne Fisher

On January 22, 2014, Anne Fisher passed away in North Vancouver at the age of 89. Formerly of Montreal and Mont Hope, Ontario, Fisher had an inquisitive mind, sharp wit and was always surrounded

by piles of books and ready to explore the new.

Not only a masterful cribbage and backgammon player, Fisher was a keen golfer and avid curler. Her curling passion, along with husband Tom, led to a dedicated involvement as collectors and founding curators of the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame. The Fishers travelled many miles collecting memorabilia and annually established a Hall of Fame display at the Scotties Tournament of Hearts and the Tim Hortons Brier. For their efforts, Tom and Anne Fisher received the Canadian Curling Association Award of Achievement in 1992.



Neil Harrison

Neil Harrison of Newmarket, Ontario, passed away on February 24, 2014, at the age of 65. He was known by everyone as a great guy, an insightful coach and one of the best lead players ever

produced in Canadian curling.

One of Harrison's last honours in a career full of them was serving as captain for Team North America at the 2011 Continental Cup in St. Albert, Alberta. Since then, "Harry," as he was known by most, wrestled with health problems. He had an easy manner, the swagger of a champion and a memorable laugh that suggested fun was always at the top of his personal agenda.

A six-time Ontario champion and former Canadian and world curling champion, Harrison is among the curlers recognized as having revolutionized the position of lead with the use of the corner guard. He was a front-ender and proud of it. Despite being a career lead, he was one of the sharpest strategists and knew the game better than most skips. It's what made him a great coach after his competitive days ended.

The pinnacle of Harrison's curling career was winning the Brier and world curling championship in 1983 as part of Ed Werenich's dream team. He also won the Canadian Firefighters Curling Championship a total of 10 times from 1978 to 2007. Harrison was inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in 1991.



Marilyn Barraclough

Marilyn Barraclough, who was instrumental in merging the Canadian Ladies Curling Association with the Canadian Curling Association, passed away in Calgary on March 27, 2014.

A passionate and dedicated volunteer throughout her life, Barraclough began in her teens by volunteering as a Cub leader and helping out at swim meets. She was especially involved with both curling and Girl Guides.

Her curling career began as a teenager, when she curled competitively as a junior. When her knees no longer allowed her to play, she began to instruct and coach as well as volunteer for board-driven district, provincial and national committees. She was also a national course conductor for many years and taught countless individuals how to coach and teach curling.

Barraclough was a firm believer in sharing ideas among curling clubs, coaches, instructors and curlers. To Barraclough, curling was and is a sport in a state of massive growth and her greatest dream was to see curling take off on a worldwide basis while still thriving in Canada.

Barraclough served as president of the Canadian Ladies Curling Association in 1988-89 and was inducted into the Curling Hall of Fame as a builder in 1990.



Sharon Renner (Knox)

Sharon Renner (Knox) of Charlottetown passed away on April 23, 2014, at the age of 73. Renner served as president of the Canadian Ladies Curling Association in 1983-84, the year that Charlottetown played host

to the 1984 Scotties Tournament of Hearts. She was inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in 1986 and the Prince Edward Island Curling Hall of Fame in 2009.

Renner was a certified Level II coach and also earned Level III status as a national curling official. In addition to her tireless work for the sport of curling, Renner was highly active in the sports of golf and lawn bowling. She served a term as president of the Canadian Seniors Games Association.



CANADIAN CURLING HALL OF FAME

Three new members have been inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame — curler Kevin Martin, builder George Cooke and former Canadian Curling Association chair Ron Hutton.

Nominations to the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame are submitted to the hall selection committee, which annually selects inductees it feels meet the criteria in one of six categories — curler, team, builder, curler/builder, builder/ media and executive honour roll.



KEVIN MARTIN Curler

Edmonton's Kevin Martin, a three-time Olympian who won gold at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver and silver in 2002 in Salt Lake City, Utah, announced his retirement

from competitive curling in April.

The only Canadian curler to have won two Olympic medals, Martin won four Brier titles — which ties him with Ernie Richardson and Randy Ferbey for the most titles as a skip — in addition to capturing a record 12 Alberta men's championships. In his four trips to the World Men's Curling Championship, he won gold in 2008 in Grand Forks, North Dakota, and silver in 1991 in Winnipeg and 2009 in Moncton, New Brunswick.

Martin's 1991 Brier victory also earned him his first of three trips to the Olympics, skipping Team Canada at the 1992 Winter Games in Albertville, France, where curling was a demonstration sport. Martin also won a record 18 World Curling Tour Grand Slam events, including his career-capping victory last April at the Players' Championship in Summerside, Prince Edward Island. He was also the 1985 Canadian junior men's champion.



GEORGE COOKE Builder

George Cooke's passion for curling goes far beyond his longtime participation at the club level. The former chief executive officer of The Dominion of Canada General Insurance

Company — now known as Travelers Canada was the driving force behind the 2009 creation of the highly successful Dominion Curling Club Championship (now the Travelers Curling Club Championship), which gives club-level curlers a chance to compete for a national title.

In fact, as a member of the reigning men's champions at his home club — the Donalda Club in Toronto — he will compete in the Travelers Curling Club Championship playdowns this fall.

In addition to being a longtime player, Cooke has been a staunch backer of the sport of curling. The Dominion was active in a number of other areas of curling, including youth camps, partnerships with the Canadian Curling Association's member associations and sponsorship of high performance curling teams. Vice-president of the Toronto Curling Association, Cooke also coaches for Crestwood Preparatory College at the Donalda Club and he will coach his daughter's competitive junior team this season.



RON HUTTON Executive Honour Roll Saint John, New Brunswick's Ron Hutton first served the sport of curling in his home province as a director and president of the Carlton Curling Club. He was president of the New Brunswick Curling Association and Curl Atlantic before being elected to the Canadian Curling Association board in 2009. He served as association chair in 2013. A curler of note, Hutton has played in men's and junior championships at the local, regional and provincial levels and has dedicated many hours as an organizer for a number of championships, including the 1985 Canadian mixed and the 2009 Ford World Men's.

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The Member Association Cup PRESENTED BY TSN

Alberta — which earned 98 points — also received the Governor's Cup for making the biggest year-to-year improvement on an average points basis.

The Canadian Curling Association has created a provincial-territorial ranking system to measure member association performances at all of the national curling championships it operates and sanctions.

The system was implemented in 2010-11 by the CCA, which is made up of 14 member associations representing Canada's 10 provinces, Northern Ontario and the territories of Yukon, Northwest Territories and Nunavut.

Member associations are ranked based on their final positions in eight annual national championships — the Canadian mixed, M&M Meat Shops Canadian junior men's and women's, Scotties Tournament of Hearts, Tim Hortons Brier, Canadian senior men's and women's and Canadian wheelchair.

The program was created to generate greater interest among curling fans across the country. For years, curling enthusiasts have enjoyed regional rivalries, debating whether their province or territory was better than another. The new system adds legitimacy to a basic ranking system, which tracks how member associations perform.

Under the new system, points totals and results are tracked and updated after each applicable Canadian championship throughout the curling season.

The 2013-14 winners were announced August 26 at the Canadian Curling Association Summit in Niagara Falls, Ontario. Based on the highest average points, the Member Association Cup, presented by TSN, was awarded to Alberta, with 98 points or an average of 12.250 per event.

Alberta's total was bolstered by three first-place performances — Darren Moulding's at the mixed, Kevin Koe's at the Brier and Kelsey Rocque's at the juniors — a runner-up finish by Val Sweeting at the Hearts and a third-place finish by Carter Lautner at the juniors.

Alberta — the member association making the biggest year-to-year improvement on an average points basis — also received the Governor's Cup for an average increase over the eight events of 2.75 points year over year.

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PAUL McLEAN AWARD

TSN director Andy Bouyoukos is the 2014 winner of the Paul McLean Award.

The award was created in 2007 by the Canadian Curling Reporters, in conjunction with TSN, in memory of McLean, a TSN executive producer, and his dedication to the sport of curling. McLean passed away on December 14, 2005, at his home in Brampton, Ontario, after a two-year battle with cancer. He was 39.

The award is presented annually to a person in the media who has made an outstanding contribution to the sport of curling from behind the scenes.

Bouyoukos worked alongside "Mac" on TSN curling broadcasts as well as other sports for many years. He began in the TV mobile as a technical producer and was named TSN's head curling director in 2000 and has since directed every TSN

Season of Champions curling broadcast. He also served as director of the men's and women's gold-medal games at the 2010 Olympic Winter Games in Vancouver, and his innovative directing techniques resulted in a Gemini Award for the work he did during the inaugural Continental Cup of Curling in 2002.

SCOTTY HARPER AWARD

Bob Weeks of the Ontario Curling Report is the winner of the 2014 Scotty Harper Award for the year's best curling story.

Shorty Jenkins — The King of Swing, Weeks' tribute to the late icemaker Shorty Jenkins, was chosen as the winner by the faculty of the School of Journalism and Communication at Carleton University in Ottawa.

The award is named for the late Scotty Harper, whose curling reports in the *Winnipeg Free Press* enlivened the paper for many years. Not awarded for a number of years, the award was re-introduced in 2005 with the assistance of the Canadian Curling Association.

NEW GOVERNORS, NEW RULES, NEW EVENT FORMATS APPROVED AT CCA ANNUAL MEETING

A productive five days of learning, discussions and meetings wrapped up with the election of two new members to the Canadian Curling Association board of governors, a new chair and vice-chair, new formats for the Canadian senior and mixed curling championships, and some tweaks to the Canadian rulebook.

The first Canadian Curling Summit, held in late August in Niagara Falls, Ontario, saw participants from across the country engage in a variety of discussions, all aimed at continuing the growth of curling in Canada.

Following the summit and the inaugural Swing & Sweep Golf Tournament — a fund-raiser for the CCA's For the Love of Curling philanthropic program — delegates from the CCA's 14 member associations as well as the board of governors met for the National Curling Congress, followed by election of officers and voting on motions.

"It was a wonderfully positive week in Niagara Falls, and I think it's safe to say that everyone came away with a really positive feeling about the future of our sport and ways to reach out to new participants, both young and old," said Greg Stremlaw, the CCA's chief executive officer. "After such an amazing 2013-14 curling season, it was great to be able to share our successes with people from across the country, while still maintaining our focus on improving on what we have, both at the high-performance and grassroots levels."

The board of governors elected Marilyn Neily of Pleasantville, Nova Scotia, as chair and Bob Osborne of St. John's, Newfoundland and Labrador, as vice-chair for the 2014-15 season. Delegates also approved the appointment of new governors Scott Comfort of Wadena, Saskatchewan, and Liz Goldenberg of North Vancouver to four-year terms.

Motions approved by delegates include:

• The two-year trial for the Canadian Mixed Doubles Curling Trials was extended for another year, with an announcement expected in the next 12 months as to whether the discipline will be included as a medal sport at the 2018 Olympic Winter Games in Pyeongchang, South Korea.

• The qualifying rounds at the Canadian mixed and Canadian seniors championships have been eliminated and replaced by a 14-team direct-entry format, similar to that used at the M&M Meat Shops Canadian Juniors. Teams will be split into two pools of seven, with the top four finishers from each pool advancing to the championship round robin. Also, Canadian mixed and seniors games have been reduced to eight ends from 10 ends, in line with international competitions.

• In keeping with World Curling Federation rules, the age of eligibility for juniors competing in the M&M Meat Shops Canadian Juniors has been moved

back six months. Currently, Canadian juniors have to be 20 years old or younger as of December 31 of the year before a Canadian championship. Starting in the 2015-16 season, junior players have to be 20 years old or younger as of June 30 of the previous year. Before this change, non-Canadian players at the World Junior Curling Championships could be up to six months older than the most senior Canadian player.

• A number of minor tweaks were made to the Canadian rulebook that will govern the sport from 2014 to 2018, including a change to game timing. Thinking time for 10-end games has been reduced to 38 minutes from 40 minutes, and to four minutes and 30 seconds from five minutes for an extra end. The WCF also recently adopted this new game-timing structure.

• A proposal to investigate potential resources to help teams participating in the gualifying round at the Tim Hortons Brier and Scotties Tournament of Hearts was approved, with a report to be presented to the membership at the 2015 National Curling Congress.
