PRESIDENT
Kate Caithness, CBE
Scotland's Kate Caithness is
the first female president of
the World Curling Federation
and the first female
president of any Olympic
winter sports federation.

First elected president of the WCF in April 2010 and re-elected without opposition in 2012, '14 and '18, Caithness has been involved with the sport of curling since the 1980s. As a member of Scotland's Royal Caledonian Curling Club, she went from playing the game to putting something back into the sport in the late 1990s. She served as president of the RCCC Ladies' Branch in 1997-98, then became an RCCC representative to the World Curling Federation.

Since 2000, Caithness has been the driving force behind the WCF's development of wheelchair curling. She was on the team that created the first World Wheelchair Curling Championship and was instrumental in the sport's inclusion at the 2006 Paralympic Winter Games in Turin, Italy.

From 2005 to '09 Caithness was an elected member of the International Paralympic Committee's five-person Sports Council Management Committee and she served on the Paralympic Games Committee from 2006 to '09.

Caithness was elected vice-president of the WCF in 2006 and served two, two-year terms under former president Les Harrison.

In March 2011, Caithness was appointed to the Olympic Program Commission, responsible for reviewing and analyzing the sports, disciplines and events program, as well as the number of athletes in each sport, for the Summer and Winter Olympics.

Married and the mother of two sons, Caithness has four grandchildren. She spends her free time with family and, when she has a chance, curling and playing golf at her home club in Edzell, Angus, where she was the Lady Captain from 2002 to '04.

THE WORLD CURLING FEDERATION

The World Curling Federation is the recognized governing body of curling in the world.

The WCF's first formal constitution was approved in 1967 under the original charter of the International Curling Federation in Perth, Scotland. The constitution was significantly adjusted in 1982, when the federation was declared independent from Scotland's Royal Caledonian Curling Club, to which its original constitution had been tied. In 1990, the official name was changed to World Curling Federation. Further significant changes were made in 1994.

The WCF has a four-part mandate:

- To represent curling internationally and to facilitate the growth of the sport through a network of member associations
- To formulate rules of the sport of curling for world competition and all other competitions approved by the WCF and to further the interests of world curling
- To conduct world curling competitions
- To provide co-operation and mutual understanding among member associations and to unite curlers throughout the world

Curling Canada welcomed three new people to its Board of Governors during the organization's Annual General Meeting. At the same time, a new affiliate

federation was brought into the fold.

There were three available spots on the Board after Cathy Dalziel of Eastern Passage, N.S., completed her term and two other members stepped down last season.

Elected to the Board for four-year terms were Brian Cowan of Delta, B.C., and Calvin Seaman of Calgary, while Roselle Gonsalves of Edmonton was elected to a two-year term. They join fellow governors Paul Addison of Victoria, Donna Krotz of London, Ont., Chana Martineau of Edmonton, Amy Nixon of Calgary, Kathy O'Rourke of Cumberland, P.E.I., Darren Oryniak of Winnipeg, and Mike Szajewski of Kenora, Ont.



CURLING CANADA AWARDS



he COVID-19 pandemic, which set the world back when it was first identified in early 2020, did not spare the sport of curling. The sport was laid low last season, and only the miracle of the Hub City Bubble in Calgary kept national and international events alive.

But the pandemic also played havoc with the men and women who would otherwise be honoured for their contributions to the sport over the past season. Regrettably, many of the award categories went dormant. But Edmonton's Jules Owchar was one person in the sport who was honoured for his contribution to Canadian curling as a coach.

JANET ARNOTT EXCEPTIONAL COACH AWARD

One of the most familiar, and respected, curling coaches in the world has been honoured again.

Jules Owchar, who has coached teams skipped by Brad Gushue and Kevin Martin to world (Gushue in 2017, Martin in 2008) and Olympic championships (Martin in 2010) in addition to helming the curling program at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology in Edmonton, has been named winner of the 2021 Janet Arnott Exceptional Coach Award.

The award recognizes exceptional coaching contributions and accomplishments over a significant period of time. It is awarded only in special circumstances to an individual who has coached at the national/high performance level, and has been a difference-maker in the sport of curling as a result of their contribution to the development, well-being or sport-for-life aspirations of an athlete, athletes or team.

The award was created by the Women in Curling Leadership Circle to recognize the exceptional attributes and contributions of the late Janet Arnott to the profession of coaching in curling. Arnott's passion, commitment and relentless pursuit of excellence were trademarks of her coaching style.

In addition to his coaching achievements with various teams, Owchar was inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in 2019.

Owchar guided Edmonton's Kevin Martin to 10 provincial championships and four Canadian championships. As Martin's coach, he has also coached at three Winter Olympics and four world championships.

After Martin's retirement at the end of the 2013-14 season, Owchar was recruited by

2006 Olympic gold medallist Brad Gushue to coach his Newfoundland and Labrador team. Since coming on board, the team has achieved much success under Owchar's tutelage, including three Tim Hortons Brier titles and a world championship.

Owchar began his career at the Northern Alberta Institute of Technology (NAIT) as a physical education instructor in 1969.







FRANCES BRODIE AWARD

Switzerland's Alina Pätz, who throws skip rocks, is the 2021 winner of the Frances Brodie Award. The award winner is selected annually by competitors in the World Women's Curling Championship as the player who best combines playing ability with sportsmanship. The award was named in honour of Scotland's Frances Brodie, one of curling's pioneering women. Brodie helped establish the women's world championship and chaired the first such event in Perth, Scotland, in 1979. The award was presented for the first time in 1989.

Nixon was elected as Chair of the Board of Governors, resuming a role she took over during the 2020-21 season.

"The past year has been equally challenging and rewarding for the Canadian curling community, and it showed what we can accomplish by working together," said Nixon. "I look forward to working with our new Board members as well as our Member Associations and other stakeholders as we continue to change the face of curling in Canada and make it truly representative of our country from coast to coast."

"We have so many opportunities in front of us as a sport; we are in the rare and enviable position of being a sport that can accommodate all ages, all abilities and all backgrounds," added Katherine Henderson, Chief Executive Officer of Curling Canada. The scholarship program received 61 entries, narrowed down to 11 recipients who will each receive \$2,500 to support their educational goals and pursuit of excellence on the curling ice. A selection panel consisting of Curling Canada officials, high-performance athletes and former scholars selected the recipients.

"To be recognized as a For the Love of a Curling Scholar with the generous support of the Governor General's Curling Club is an incredible honour. I am so grateful for the opportunity to join the Governor General's Curling Club's promotion of youth curling in my community and beyond," said Chantel Hoag. "This award aids in my pursuit of excellence in both curling and my education. In the spirit of inclusion, I would love to use the platform set forth by this scholarship to encourage people of all ages, genders, orientations and backgrounds to participate in the great sport of curling."

Hoag will be honoured by the Governor General's Curling Club at its Annual Meeting dinner on Sept. 13.

Applicants had to be enrolled full-time for at least two semesters at a Canadian university or college, registered to compete for Canadian Team Ranking System points during the 2021-22 curling season, and 23 years of age or under as of Dec. 31, 2022.

In addition to Henderson, the selection panel included previous scholarship recipients Karsten Sturmay, Mackenzie Zacharias and Nathan Young, highperformance athlete and owner of Dynasty Curling Colin Hodgson and Olympian and six-time Scotties champion Jill Officer.

The Curling Canada philanthropic program, introduced during the 2013-14 season to help develop and grow youth and junior curling across Canada, received donations totaling more than \$280,000 last season. Programs such as The Egg Farmers Rocks & Rings presented by Curling Canada, Hit Draw Tap presented by Tim Hortons and For the Love of Curling scholarships are only made possible thanks to the generous support of Canada's curling community.



For the Love of Curling

THE 2022 OLYMPIC WINTER GAMES



URLING WILL ONCE AGAIN HAVE three medals available at the 2022 Olympic Winter Games next February in Beijing, China.

And in order to determine mixed doubles, women's and men's Olympic champions, the sport is being played over the course of 19 days of competition, which is two extra days that need to be played beginning on the Wednesday before the Opening Ceremony. It will all take place at the National Aquatics Centre, also known as the Water Cube. The venue, which is traditionally used for aquatics events, including at the 2008 Summer Olympics and Paralympics Games, has been renovated to host curling events.

It will be the seventh time that curling has been a full-medal sport, and the 2022 edition kicks off with the mixed doubles competition on Feb. 2 — two days before the official opening ceremony. That competition will conclude with medal games on Tuesday, Feb. 8. The four-player competition for men and women begins the


following day and concludes with the men's gold-medal game on Saturday, Feb. 19, and the women's gold-medal game the following day.

The Games officially welcomed curling in July 1992, when the IOC announced that curling would be recognized for the first time as a medal sport at the 1998 Olympic Winter Games in Japan. Curling made its Olympic debut as a full-medal sport in 1998 at Kazakoshi Park Arena in Karuizawa, Japan, about an hour from downtown Nagano.

Curling made its next Olympic appearance in Salt Lake City, Utah, in 2002 at The Ice Sheet arena on the campus of Weber State University in Ogden, Utah, 45 kilometres north of Salt Lake City.

Four years later, in 2006, the Olympic curling competition took place at the Palaghiaccio, a multi-purpose ice arena in Pinerolo, Italy, 35 kilometres southwest of Torino.

Vancouver played host to the 2010 Olympics and the curling events were held at the 5,600-seat Vancouver Olympic/Paralympic Centre.



In 2014, the 3,000-seat Ice Cube Curling Center in Sochi, Russia, hosted the curling competition.

Mixed doubles curling made its debut at the 2018 Olympic Winter Games in Pyeongchang, South Korea at the 3,500-seat Gangneung Curling Centre. It was the first time three medals were awarded in a curling competition at the Olympic Winter Games.

THE ROAD TO BEIJING

The World Curling Federation has 66 member associations, but only 10 women's and men's teams are allowed to participate at the medal level of the 2022 Games in four-player competition. For mixed doubles, there is an increased quota of 10 teams competing at Beijing 2022, compared to eight teams in 2018.

Although Scotland, Wales and England compete individually in the world championships, Great Britain has only one entry in the Olympics. For 2022, only Scotland was nominated to earn Olympic points and qualification on behalf of Great Britain. China, as host nation, has berths in both the men's and women's team competitions, in addition to the mixed doubles event.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and the cancellation of the 2020 world championships, all Olympic qualification was determined through the 2021 championships. The six highest-ranked men's and women's teams earned berths to the Olympic Winter Games.

The remaining three men's and women's berths will be determined at a WCF Olympic Qualification Event to be staged Dec. 5-18 at Elfsedenhal in Leeuwarden, Netherlands.

For mixed doubles, the seven highest-ranked teams at the World Mixed Doubles Curling Championship earned spots in the mixed doubles discipline at the Olympic Winter Games.

The final two teams will also be determined at the WCF Olympic Qualification Event taking place in Leeuwarden. ■




