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BEAU WELLING of the United States has made a rapid climb up the ladder in international curling.

As a late-to-the-game fan of the sport, the American is concluding his second year as president of the World Curling.

He replaced President Kate Caithness CBE in 2022 at the conclusion of her 12-year term of office.

Welling is the 11th president World Curling and is the second president from the U.S., following Dr. Donald F. Barcome from 1988–1990.

Welling was elected as a board member of World Curling in 2018, with his original four-year term concluding in 2022.

Welling was the chair of the Structural Review Group and prior to his time with World Curling was an independent board director of the United States Curling Association from 2007 until 2018.

Welling, a golfer, came into the sport of curling in a rather unconventional way. He first saw the sport on television and was immediately drawn to the other Scottish sport. Ultimately, he visited a U.S. national championship in person which then led him to being asked to become an independent director. Years later, he became a curler himself, founding the Palmetto Curling Club in Greenville, S.C.

"I was fascinated watching the sport on television and was able to learn a lot quickly from one of my golf colleagues who grew up in Northern Ontario," recalled Welling, "Curling is a strategic game that fits my brain. I have a degree in physics so that aspect of the sport was interesting to me, as well as the fact that golf and curling come out of the same Scottish ether."

Welling is excited about continuing the execution of World Curling's six, new Big Ideas generated from the Ideation Seminar held in Toronto in the spring of 2023.

"Curling is at its best when we're organized, focused and working together toward common goals and objectives," Welling said. "I'm excited about the direction we're moving, the meaningful change happening and new opportunities ahead, while humbled to continue serving our sport's special community of people."

Welling is the Founder and CEO of Beau Welling Design, a golf course design and land-planning firm based in Greenville, S.C.

WORLD CURLING

World Curling is the world governing body of the Olympic winter sport of curling and the Paralympic winter sport of wheelchair curling. Originally founded in 1966 as the International Curling Federation, it initially changed its name to the World Curling Federation in 1990. Following a brand refresh and modernisation in 2024, it changed its name to World Curling.

Today, World Curling is managed by a Board, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents and six Directors, which includes the Athlete Commission Chair. They are elected by World Curling's Member Associations and are supported by staff based at the headquarters in Perth, Scotland and around the world.

"I was grateful for the opportunity to serve a year on the Board of Governors, and learned a great deal about what goes on in the area of governance in our sport that I think, it's safe to say, we as athletes didn't truly understand or appreciate," said Walker. "We're also appreciative that we will have a role to play with the Board of Governors to offer our perspectives to their discussions."







Anderson's team from Saskatoon has set a record that may never been broken by winning five consecutive Canadian senior women's championships, and it could have been six were it not for the pandemic.

Team Anderson started that amazing streak by winning its first national championship in 2017 at Fredericton, N.B., and then followed up with victories in 2018 at Stratford, Ont., 2019 at Chilliwack, B.C., 2021 at Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., and 2022 at Yarmouth, N.S.

In addition to their Canadian championship victories, Team Anderson also shone on the world stage, winning three gold medals at the World Senior Curling Championships — in 2018 at Östersund, Sweden, in 2019 at Stavanger, Norway, and last year at Gangneung, South Korea.


Nixon's impact on the sport of curling has been profound, both on and off the ice.

Most recently, she served five years on the Curling Canada Board of Governors, and also was elected Chair of the Board of Governors in June 2021, and stayed in that role until the fall of 2022 — the completion of her four-year term. She also agreed to rejoin the Board for the 2022-23 season to help with the orientation process for new governors who had joined the Board.

During her time as Chair of the Curling Canada Board, Curling Canada held its highly successful Bubble events in Nixon's hometown of Calgary, and she volunteered often as a scorekeeper during those three months of Bubble events, all the while contributing to the Board's oversight of the events and risk evaluations.

As a player, Nixon, was the vice-skip for Shannon Kleibrink's Canadian team that won bronze at the 2006 Winter Olympics, and a silver medal at the 2008 Scotties Tournament of Hearts. She played the same position for Chelsea Carey's 2016 Scotties Tournament of Hearts championship team, and was the alternate for Heather Nedohin's 2012 Scotties champs.

There were no nominations, thus no Volunteer of the Year or Ray Kingsmith Award winners named this past season.

Donna Spencer of The Canadian Press has been awarded the Paul McLean Award as a person who has made a significant contribution to curling behind the scenes.

Spencer received the award at WinSport Arena during the 2024 Scotties Tournament of Hearts in Calgary.

A sports reporter at The Canadian Press since 1999, Spencer has covered curling for the national news service since her first year.

Spencer has witnessed some of the sport's greatest moments covering 16 Tournament of Hearts, 13 world championships, nine Briers and five Winter Olympic Games.

Spencer reported on Canada's Brad

Gushue winning an Olympic gold medal in 2006, Brad Jacobs doing the same in 2014 and Kaitlyn Lawes and John Morris winning the first Olympic gold medal in curling mixed doubles in 2018.

The award was created in 2007 by the Canadian Curling Reporters — now the Professional Curling Media Association of Canada — in conjunction with TSN, in memory of McLean, a highly-respected TSN executive producer, for his dedication to CFL football, world junior hockey and, of course, curling. McLean passed away on Dec. 14, 2005, at his home in Brampton, Ont., after a two-year battle with cancer. He was 39.


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FOR THE LOVE OF CURLING SCHOLARSHIPS

he For the Love of Curling Scholarships have been awarded annually since 2014 to young competitors and champions to assist them in achieving excellence in the sport from the provincial/territorial level to international competition while balancing their academic studies.

The Fran Todd All Heart Scholarships, new this year, are for young curling student-athletes who best demonstrate volunteer and community leadership through sport. The scholarships support these young leaders in creating meaningful change through curling and reward compassionate young curlers by supporting their dreams.

"We're entering a new era of support for young curlers of all passions and pursuits. While reviewing scholarship applications over the years, it has been clear that many young curlers are eager to share their love of curling to better their communities. By offering a record-setting number of scholarships this year, we can truly recognize and support the pillars of the curling community," said Brodie Bazinet, Curling Canada's Senior Manager of Philanthropy & Youth Impacts.

The Scholarship selection panel chose 20 recipients, 10 for each scholarship stream, who will each receive a \$2,500 scholarship. It adds up to a \$50,000 contribution to the future of the sport, with \$283,300 awarded since 2014 to 139 deserving young curling champions, leaders, and community builders.

Of the 20 recipients, the Governor General's Curling Club – an honourary society under the patronage of the Governor General since 1874 – selected two deserving applicants to receive scholarships financially supported by donations from its members.

The Governor General's Curling Club has been steadfast in its support of student-athlete curlers. With the scholarships awarded to Amber Gargul and Nathan Poklar, The Governor General's Curling Club has invested \$12,500 to deserving recipients through Curling Canada's scholarship programs.

"The Governor General's Curling Club is proud to extend our support of these vital scholarship programs to student-athletes who are bettering the sport and their communities," said Governor General's Curling Club selection panel member Wil Thurlow. "We are pleased to continue investing in the future of the sport and play a role in assisting some well-deserving studentathletes."
