Line-up shift doesn't work for Scots

They flirted with disaster but now Brad Jacobs' rink has a chance to be world champions.

Jacobs and his team of third Ryan Fry, second E. J. Harnden and lead Ryan Harnden began the day one loss removed from playing in the bronze medal game. A 6-3, nine-end victory against David Murdoch's rink from Scotland in Saturday afternoon's semifinal leaves them one win away from a gold medal at the 2013 Ford World Men's Curling Championship, presented by Booster Juice.

"This is our team," said an emotional Jacobs. "We are grinders. We don't like to do things the easy way, apparently.

"We were taught at an early age never give up."

Jacobs will play Sweden's Niklas Edin in Sunday afternoon's final.

"They are good friends of ours off the ice and rivals on the ice," said Jacobs, a bank account manager from Sault Ste. Marie. Ont. "Hopefully it's going to be everything that everyone expects, a back-and-forth battle."

Jacobs took advantage of a Murdoch miss to break open a close game in the sixth end. Murdoch attempted a hit and stay, but his rock skimmed off the Canadian stone and slid out of the house. Jacobs used a tap-back for three points and a 5-2 lead.


Murdoch knew then his chances of winning a third world championship had been badly damaged.

"I didn't think it was all over but it was certainly a bad blow to us," said Murdoch, who will play Denmark's Rasmus Stjerne for the bronze medal.

Things got worse in the eighth. Murdoch missed trying to remove a pair of Canadian stones, giving Jacobs a steal of one for a 6-2 lead

"That's just curling," sighed Murdoch. "When you go for these big shots you do hope for a wee bit of luck and we never got it."

Scotland opened with the hammer and scored one in the first end. The next two ends



were blanked before Canada finally got on the board in the fourth when Jacobs used a takeout to score a deuce.

Both Fry and E. J. Harnden made some big

shots early. Fry had the crowd cheering after a triple takeout in the third end. Canadian flags waved when Harnden cleared the house of Scottish rocks in the fifth.

It will be the seventh time Canada has met Sweden in the final. Canada's hold a 4-2 and has won the last four games.

Edin isn't worried about the momentum Jacobs' rink brings into the final.

"I just think we need to play the way we have," said the two-time world champion bronze medallist. "I don't think they seem to be on a role.

"They've had a couple of good games lately but they struggled in the round robin, the same as we did. It's a struggle to be (in the final) and I think both teams will be happy to be in the final. Hopefully it will be a good game."

Jacobs' rink needed a 8-6 win over Denmark earlier Saturday to advance from the 3-4 Page playoff game. Murdoch, who had finished first overall in the round with a 8-3 record, lost 6-5 to Edin in Friday night's 1-2 playoff game.

Fry seals deal with big triple



Brad Jacobs always swore his rink would go down swinging.

Third Ryan Fry delivered the knockout blow with a triple takeout in the 10th end as the team from Sault St. Marie, Ont., defeated Rasmus Stjerne of Denmark 8-6 in Saturday afternoon's 3-4 Page playoff game at the 2013 Ford World Men's Curling Championship, presented by Booster Juice.

The win put Canada in the evening semifinal game against David Murdoch of Scotland. The winner of that game advanced to Sunday's final against Sweden's Niklas Edin.

Jacobs' rink of Fry, second E. J. Harnden and lead Ryan Harnden wobbled into the playoffs losing four of their last six round-robin games. They found their legs against Den-



mark using a booming takeout in the sixth end and a finesse draw in the eighth.

"It's not easy to dig yourself out when you put yourself in a hole," said Fry. "The team is really strong at sticking with one another. I thought we were pretty composed as a team out there."

Stjerne drops into the bronze medal game against the semifinal

loser.

"We didn't come up with the really big key shots," said the former world junior champion who beat Canada during the round robin. "They made some huge ones."

The crowd at the Save-on-Foods Memorial Centre let out a huge roar when Fry knocked three Danish stones out of the house in the 10th, pretty much throttling any chance of a Stjerne victory.

"Ryan killed the game with the triple," said Stjerne. "You know Canadians. In the playoffs they always step it up."

A close match turned in Jacobs favour in the sixth end. The 27-yearold skip produced a load cheer from the crowd when he coolly threw a raise takeout to remove a pair of Danish rocks and score two points for a 4-3 lead.

Jacobs took advantage of a Danish

miss in the eighth. Stjerne attempted a long raise takeout but his rock rolled too far. Jacobs didn't miss with a draw for two.

There were a few tight collars when Jacobs missed a double takeout in the ninth. One of the Danish rocks remained in the house, leaving Stjerne a draw for two to tie the game 6-6.

"When Fry made that shot in 10, that's the loudest cheer we've ever had for our team," said Jacobs. "When you hear that, you really want to close that game out for the crowd.

"We went out and played really well. I think that do-or-die situation really brings the best out of us."

After starting the week 5-0 Jacobs' rink finished in a three-way tie for second place with a 7-4 record.

Jacobs said having Friday off allowed the team to regroup physically and mentally.

"That's the biggest reason we were able to come out refreshed and so hungry," he said. "We played awesome."

Jacobs' rink has taken the long road to the final before. They came out of the 3-4 playoff game at the Brier to defeat Manitoba's Jeff Stoughton in the final.

The last Canadian rink to play in the 3-4 game at the men's worlds was Randy Ferbey at the 2005 championship in Victoria. Ferbey went on to defeat Scotland's David Murdoch in the final.

It's the first time since 1990 Denmark has reached the playoffs. That rink, which went on to win the bronze medal, was skipped by Tommy Stjerne, Rasmus's father. It's third was Ivan Frederiksen, the father of current third Johnny Frederiksen.

Denmark started the tournament 0-2 then won it's next five games.



Saint John group looks ahead to 2014

Organizers of next year's Ford World Women's Curling Championship are hoping the excitement of the Winter Olympics spills over from the Black Sea coast to the shore of the Bay of Fundy.

The 2014 women's world championship will be held March 15-23 in Saint John, N.B., at the 6,500-seat Harbour Station. The event begins about two weeks after the curling medals are handed out at the Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia.

"You will be able to watch some of those teams from Sochi, literally two weeks later they will be in our city," said Jeff Lacey, chair of the host organizing committee.

"It does add a little bit more value. We are going to use that in our marketing a little bit."

Lacey and members of his committee spent time at this week's world men's curling championship Victoria, getting a behind-the-scenes look at how the event was operated at the Save-on-Foods Memorial Centre.

"We just want to have a look and see what model is used here, maybe learn from that a one draw, or two folks can attend 11 draws," he little bit," said Lacey. "It gives an opportunity said. to my vice-chairs to get a little bit of a feel for the event.

"It's a good little testing ground so we are not going in totally blind next year."

People attending next year's event will be able to walk from the arena to two of the city's major hotels via a pedway system.

"A lot of the fans will be able to park their car and walk where ever they want to go," said Lacey.

The women's worlds will be the first major curling event held in Saint John since the 1999 world championship. That event combined both the men and women

Scotland's Hammy McMillan won the men's gold, defeating Canada's Jeff Stoughton in the final. Sweden's Elisabet Gustafson won the women's goal, beating American Patti Lank.

Lacey said one of the ticket options available for Saint John is a flex package with 22 vouch-

ers.

"You can take you and 21 of your friends to

Already there has been a strong response to tickets.

"Saint John is a little bit starving for a curling event," he said. "It's been a long wait."

The Scotties Tournament of Hearts, which will determine Canada's team attending the women's world championship, will be held Feb. 1-9 in Montreal.

The 2014 Tim Hortons Brier will be March 1-9 in Kamloops, B.C. Next year's men's world championship will be in Beijing March 29 to April 6, 2014.




"Canada's the biggest seller for flags obviously, followed by Scotland, which we actually ran out of one night," he added.

Come what may, experience golden

Prior to the start of this week's Ford World Men's Curling Championship, presented by Booster Juice, Brad Jacobs said his rink was going to treat it "as another curling bonspiel."

Jacobs and his Sault Ste. Marie., Ont., team have learned the world championship is like another bonspiel like Game 7 of the Stanley Cup final is just another hockey game. The game is the same but everything else is different.

Like any team competing at their first major international event Jacobs' team has faced a steep learning curve.

"It's been a good learning experience," said Jacobs. "It's completely different playing these European teams as opposed to playing against Canadian teams."

Jacobs has played in five Tim Hortons Briers where he could go to school on the shots made by former world champions like Kevin Martin and Glenn Howard. At times this week Jacobs has felt like he was watching a foreign movie without subtitles.

"When you play against some of the top Canadian teams you can read the ice off their rocks," said the bank accountant manager. "Here, in a lot of instances, you can't.

"It's really tough and frustrating when guys are making everything on you. Sometimes you can't do anything but stand back, smile, and take it."

Second E. J. Harnden said the rink tried not to get distracted by what went on around them, or by how the other teams



played.

"All we can do is make our shots and worry about ourselves," he said. "I think it is distracting sometimes (when) you see a team that calls a shot that probably isn't the right call but makes it and sets themselves up.

"It is a little demoralizing sometimes, a little frustrating. Traditionally that's not the way to do things. If it's working for them, that's great. We have to execute ours better."

What third Ryan Fry came to

understand is, at the world championship, every game is high noon. Canada is considered the top gun. Every other team is the new gunslinger in town wanting to test them.

"I do think the Brier is a tougher event to win, but the field is 100 per cent deeper in the words than it is in the Brier," said Fry, a 34-year-old business owner. "When you play in the Brier, you're playing against teams that will lay down a little to you because they're intimidated.

"When you're playing in the worlds, their (other teams) sole

mission is to beat Canada. They are coming out with their absolute best performance. We lost four games here (in the round robin). I would put the onus on us for a couple we didn't play very well. Two of the games we played against teams that played unbelievable against us. They played better than the Kevin Martins, the Howards, the Stoughtons. They would have beaten anyone in Canada on that day."

At 27 years old, Jacobs is the youngest Canadian skip at the world championship since a 24-year-old Kevin Martin competed in 1991, losing in the final to Scotland.

Another thing Jacobs' rink probably didn't count on was the mental and physical fatigue they experienced. During the week Jacobs sent out a tweet saying he felt 65 years old and mentally done.

That might explain why Jacobs' rink of Fry, E. J. Harnden and lead Ryan Harnden burst from the gate like thoroughbreds, winning their first five games, but then stumbled down the stretch with loses in four of their last six matches. After leading the pack most of the week Jacobs slipped to fourth with a 7-4 record.

Former world champion Russ Howard said it's always a challenge dealing with the distractions and commitments of being Team Canada. Especially when a world championship is played at home.

"In Canada, all the media is on Brad," said Howard, who is now a TSN analyst. "There's a lot more distractions than I think they've been used to.

"There are commitments and doing different things. You get pulled in nine different directions. You get pretty tired."

Canada has won the last three world titles and five in the last six years. The win streak has fuelled Canadian expectations but maybe doesn't take into account how much the rest of the curling world has improved.

Team Canada suffered round-robin losses for the first time ever this week against the Czech Republic and Japan. They also were beaten by Denmark for the first time since 2003.

"That's been difficult for this Canadian team," said Howard. "Ten years ago you were beating Denmark. You were beating these guys by five or six points. "They are good now. We have to face it."


Maybe the hardest thing about treating the world champion like another event is the Maple Leaf Jacobs and his team wore on their back. At a Brier you represent a province. You are another team in the pack. At the worlds you are Canada's team and under a nation's scrutiny.

"When you have that Maple Leaf on, and there's a lot of people in the stands, you want to do even better for them and you want to get everyone in the building involved," said Jacobs.

"That's fine. This is what we've dreamed of ever since we were kids, to be in a position where we are. This is what we live for."

Jacobs' rink is part of the next wave of Canadian curlers. They have the potential to reach many more world championships.

Hopefully they will look back and chuckle about how they planned to treat the first one like another bonspiel.

Fussen, Germany named host of World Olympic trials

World teams hoping to play at next year's Winter Olympic Games now know where they will make their last stand.

The German city of Fussen was named Friday as host of the inaugural World Curling Federation Olympic Qualification Event. The Dec. 11-15 competition will select the final two men's and women's team spots for the curling competition at the Sochi Olympics.

Games will be played at the 3,500 seat BLZ Arena. Fussen also hosted the 2007 European Curling Championships.

"We expect them to be able to draw on this expertise, to ensure that the qualification event is an even greater success," WCF president Kate Caithness said in a release.

Dieter Kolb, president of the German Curling Association, said his association is thrilled with the opportunity to host the event.

"We will guarantee an outstanding curling event in a magnificent arena," he said.

Eight of 10 nations have qualified women's teams for the Olympics. Sweden, Switzerland, Scotland, Canada, the U.S., Denmark and Korea have all qualified directly, based on points gathered for their final ranking at the 2012 and 2013 World Women's Curling Championships. Russia qualified as the host nation.

The teams left battling for the two Olympic spots are Germany, Japan, China, Italy, Latvia, Czech Republic and Norway.

The World Curling Federation will give official confirmation of the men's teams that have qualified directly for Sochi and those heading to Fussen following the conclusion of the Ford World Men's Curling Championship.

Canada's two Olympic curling teams will be determined at the Tim Hortons Roar of the Rings competition, Dec. 1-8, in Winnipeg.



Jacobs' rink won their first five games of the week, including a 9-4 thrashing of Scotland, before losing four of their last six to finish the round-robin 7-4.





Duguid, Northcott enter WCF Hall of Fame

Two of Canada's most accomplished curlers will be inducted into the World Curling Hall of Fame, it was announced by the World Curling Federation (WCF) and Canadian Curling Association (CCA).

Three-time world champion Ron Northcott and two-time world champ Don Duguid will officially be inducted into the Hall on Sunday during the closing banquet of the Ford World Men's Curling Championship, presented by Booster Iuice.

"The Canadian Curling Association and curling fans across our country are thrilled to see Don Duguid and Ron Northcott inducted into the World Curling Hall of Fame," said CCA Chief Executive Officer Greg Stremlaw. "The achievements of Don and Ron speak for themselves, and just as importantly they represented themselves, our country and our sport with class and professionalism."

Northcott (born Dec. 31, 1935) put together Jim Shields in 1968 and Dave Gerlach in 1969. a team in Calgary that followed in the footsteps of the legendary Ernie Richardson foursome from Saskatchewan. Northcott put together a 23-2 cumulative record en route to winning world titles (known as the Scotch Cup from 1959 through 1967) in 1966 (8-0 at Vancouver),

1968 (8-1 at Pointe-Claire, Que., when the event became known as the Air Canada Silver Broom) and 1969 (7-1 at Perth, Scotland). Northcott had the same front end - lead Fred Storey and second Bernie Sparkes - for all three of those titles, and three different thirds: George Fink in 1966,

Known as the "Owl," Northcott won six Alberta championships, and also was named to Canada's Sports Hall of Fame in 1970 and the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in 1973, and was appointed to the Order of Canada in 1976.

"I definitely was thrilled. I was totally sur-

Duguid (born Jan. 25, 1935) took up the Canadian cause the year after Northcott's last world title. Backed up by third Rod Hunter, second Jim Pettapiece and lead Bryan Wood, the Winnipeg powerhouse swept to back-to-back unbeaten world championships, going 8-0 in 1970 at Utica, N.Y., and 9-0 a year later in Megève, France.

Previously, Duguid had played third for Terry Braunstein's 1965 Brier championship quartet, and made it to the final of the 1965 world championship in Perth, Scotland, finishing second (5-2) after losing the final to Bud Somerville of the United States.

Duguid, who turned to broadcasting after his competitive playing career was over (he worked for CBC and NBC), was inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in 1974 and Canada's Sports Hall of Fame in 1991.

"It's a great honour; it's unbelievable," said Duguid. "I'm in the Manitoba Curling Hall of Canadian Curling Hall of Fame, the Canadian world-curling-hall-of-fame.
