BEAU WELLING of the United States has made a rapid climb up the ladder in international curling.

As a late-to-the-game fan of the sport, the American is concluding his third year as president of the World Curling.

He replaced President Kate Caithness CBE in 2022 at the conclusion of her 12-year term of office.

Welling is the 11th president World Curling and is the second president from the U.S., following Dr. Donald F. Barcome from 1988–1990.

Welling was elected as a board member of World Curling in 2018, with his original four-year term concluding in 2022.

Welling was the chair of the Structural Review Group and prior to his time with World Curling was an independent board director of the United States Curling Association from 2007 until 2018.

Welling, a golfer, came into the sport of curling in a rather unconventional way. He first saw the sport on television and was immediately drawn to the other Scottish sport. Ultimately, he visited a U.S. national championship in person which then led him to being asked to become an independent director. Years later, he became a curler himself, founding the Palmetto Curling Club in Greenville, S.C.

“I was fascinated watching the sport on television and was able to learn a lot quickly from one of my golf colleagues who grew up in Northern Ontario,” recalled Welling. “Curling is a strategic game that fits my brain. I have a degree in physics so that aspect of the sport was interesting to me, as well as the fact that golf and curling come out of the same Scottish ether.”

Welling is looking forward to executing and building on World Curling’s nine initiatives that were developed following the constitution of the new Board at the World Curling Congress in 2024.

“Curling is at its best when we’re organized, focused and working together toward common goals and objectives,” Welling said. “I’m excited about the direction we’re moving, the meaningful change happening and new opportunities ahead, while humbled to continue serving our sport’s special community of people.”

Welling is the Founder and CEO of Beau Welling Design, a golf course design and land-planning firm based in Greenville, S.C.

WORLD CURLING

World Curling is the world governing body of the Olympic winter sport of curling and the Paralympic winter sport of wheelchair curling. Originally founded in 1966 as the International Curling Federation, it initially changed its name to the World Curling Federation in 1990. Following a brand refresh and modernisation in 2024, it changed its name to World Curling.

Today, World Curling is managed by a Board, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents and eight Directors, which includes the Athlete Commission Chair and two independent directors. They are elected by World Curling’s Member Associations and are supported by staff based at the headquarters in Perth, Scotland and around the world.

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CURLING CANADA 2025-26 BOARD OF GOVERNORS

ONE NEW MEMBER HAS JOINED AND ANOTHER member was re-elected to Curling Canada's Board of Governors following votes at Curling Canada's Annual General Meeting.

Canadian curling's governing body held its virtual AGM Sept. 21, with 14 Member Associations along with invited guests speaking about the past season, in addition to conducting elections to finalize the Board of Governors for the 2025-26 season.

Rob Belliveau of Halifax will be a first-year member of the Board of Governors, replacing outgoing Board member Calvin Ruus of Calgary, while Jeremy Woo of Winnipeg successfully ran for re-election. Both are four-year terms.

They join fellow Board members Ray Baker of Dauphin, Man., Roselle Gonsalves of Porters Lake, N.S., Scott Hindle of Ottawa, Jennifer Howard of Courtice, Ont., Jody Fisher Meli of Lethbridge, Alta., Teri Palynchuk of Nanaimo, B.C., Rémy St-Pierre of Québec City and Kerry Tarasoff of Saskatoon.

Palynchuk was re-elected as Chair of the Board of Governors.

"We have much to look forward to over the coming season, and I truly believe our organization is in a strong position thanks to our continued focus on collaboration and forward-thinking," said Palynchuk. "I want to thank Calvin for his service to our sport during his time with our Board, and I want to congratulate both Jeremy and Rob, and

we look forward to working with them for the coming year."

The Curling Canada Athlete Advisory Council (AAC) also has a new-look Board in place for the 2025-26 season, and will have input and a consultative role with Curling Canada's governors, as well as Curling Canada's Events and High Performance staff.

The AAC has representation at Board of Governors meetings and will be able to speak at meetings.

Laura Walker will continue as AAC Chair, with Brett Gallant as Vice-Chair. Other members are Karl Allen, Brendan Bottcher, Chelsea Carey, Matt Dunstone, Chrissy Molnar, Jocelyn Peterman, and Kayla Skrlík.

The AAC comprises representatives from men's and women's four-player curling, mixed doubles curling and wheelchair curling, and are elected by their peers — all of whom must be members of Curling Canada's National Team Program.

"We will continue to advocate for curling athletes and provide our voice at the table with Curling Canada's Board of Governors," said Walker. "We're looking forward to being able to provide our perspective with some new voices on our Council, and we want to thank the outgoing members, Shannon Birchard, Karlee Burgess, Jacques Gauthier, E.J. Harnden, Jon Thurston, Sarah Wilkes, for their past efforts and contributions with the AAC."





Martin named to Order of Sport, Canada's highest sporting honour

Add one more feather to the cap of Kevin Martin, one of the greatest skips to play the game.

Martin, 59, was named to the Class of 2025, selected to receive the Order of Sport, Canada's highest sporting honour.

The five other Athletes chosen include Erik Guay (alpine skiing); Christine Sinclair (soccer); Michelle Stilwell (para-athletics); and Darren Zack (softball).

In the Builder category, Martha Billes (sport administration) and Ted Nolan (ice hockey) were chosen.

"Each year, we are inspired by the incredible number of nominations that come in from coast to coast to coast — submitted by students, families, communities, and sport leaders — who truly understand the power of sport to transform lives," said Cheryl Bernard, President & CEO of Canada's Sports Hall of Fame (CSHoF). "The Class of 2025 is nothing short of extraordinary. Their achievements and impact extend well beyond the field of play. Their stories of resilience, leadership, and lasting legacy will continue to unite and inspire Canadians for generations to come."

The Class of 2025 will receive the Order of Sport and be formally inducted into CSHoF on Oct. 29, 2025, at the Canadian Museum of History during the 69th Annual Order of Sport Awards, presented by Everest Funeral Concierge.

Martin who grew up in Loughheed, Alta., helped change the face of the game during his outstanding career. His incredible run of provincial, national and international events earned him the title of Canada's greatest male curler in a 2019 TSN poll of broadcasters, reporters, and elite curlers.

Over his 30-year curling career, he won four Canadian men's titles, a gold medal at the 2010 Winter Olympics,

and a world championship in 2008. He went to a total of three Winter Olympics and four world championships, and won a total of two Olympic medals and three world championship medals.

He was elected to the World Curling Hall of Fame in 2018.

Another high profile skip was also big news, although for a completely different reason.

Newfoundland and Labrador curler Brad Gushue — a two-time Olympic medallist who has won more national men's curling championships than anyone else in the sport — announced he will retire from competitive curling at the end of this season.

Gushue cited a desire to spend more time with his family, and completion of the goals he set out to achieve as an athlete.

Gushue is a six-time Brier champion.

Sharing the curling spotlight in the past season was Jock Tyre, general manager of the Kelowna Curling Club, who won the 2025 Ray Kingsmith Award for outstanding volunteer. He was a tireless volunteer in administration and management roles in the sport of curling.

The award honours individuals who best demonstrate a similar commitment and dedication to our sport.

Since arriving in Kelowna more than three decades ago, Tyre has transformed the Kelowna Curling Club into one of the top and most innovative curling facilities in the world. He is constantly looking for new ways to do business and bring newcomers into the curling community, and is a tireless booster of the sport.

Others receiving accolades this past season were Michael Szajewski, of Kenora, Ont., enshrined into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame's Executive Honour Roll as a two-time Chair of Curling Canada's Board of Governors, and Andrea Ronnebeck who won the Joan Mead Builders Award.

Szajewski served on the Northern Ontario Curling Association board of directors for 10 years, and was president from 2017 to 2020. Later, he was elected to the Curling Canada Board in 2020, and was Chair from 2022 through to 2024.

Ronnebeck, a lifelong resident of Northern Ontario, has coached athletes of all levels for more than 40 years, and at five Scotties Tournament of Hearts.

For the second straight year, Nova Scotia Curling won the For The Love of Curling Cup, which goes to the Member Association that has the best combined results at Curling Canada's NextGen events — the New Holland Canadian Under-20 Men's and Women's Championships, and the Canadian Under-18 Championships.

That was the highlight of the culmination of Curling Canada's three annual Member Association season-long Cup competitions.

Each Member Association earns points based on the performance of its respective provincial/territorial championship-winning teams from the 15 national championship events that are either operated by, or sanctioned by, Curling Canada.

Those include the Montana's Brier; the Scotties Tournament of Hearts; the New Holland Canadian Under-20 Men's and Women's Championships; the Canadian Under-18 Championships; the Canadian Senior Men's and Women's Championships; the Canadian Curling Club Men's and Women's Championships; the Canadian Mixed Championship; the Canadian Mixed Doubles Championship; the Canadian Wheelchair Championship; and the Canadian Masters (60 and over) Men's and Women's Championships.

It was also a proud year for Canada's Wayne Middaugh who was elected, along with two others, to the World Curling Hall of Fame.

Middaugh was one of the most versatile and accomplished curlers in history. He is the only player to win World Men's Curling Championship gold medals playing in three different positions — a testament to his versatility and extraordinary talent.

He earned gold in 1993 in Geneva, Switzerland, playing second for Russ Howard, skipped Canada to victory in 1998 in Kamloops, B.C., and added another in 2012 in Basel, Switzerland, playing third/vice-skip for Glenn Howard.

He also represented Ontario at 10 different national men's championships.

Middaugh was previously inducted into the Canadian Curling Hall of Fame in 2020, following a decorated career disrupted by a skiing injury in 2016.

PAUL McLEAN AWARD

Ted Wyman, the longtime curling writer for the Winnipeg Sun, who lost his battle with cancer in November, 2024, was awarded the 2025 Paul McLean Award posthumously. He was 58.

The award was presented in Thunder Bay during the 2025 Scotties Tournament of Hearts. The award was accepted by his son Chris.

“Ted covered our sport with passion and integrity and earned the trust of curlers and curling fans across Canada with his knowledge of the sport,” Curling Canada said in a statement.

Wyman began his career at the Brandon Sun in 1992 before joining the Moose Jaw Times-

Herald. He later became sports editor of the Winnipeg Sun where he covered the hometown Jets, Blue Bombers and curling.

The award was created in 2007 by the Canadian Curling Reporters — now the Professional Curling Media Association of Canada — in conjunction with TSN, in memory of McLean, a highly-respected TSN executive producer, for his dedication to CFL football, world junior hockey and, of course, curling.

McLean passed away on Dec. 14, 2005, at his home in Brampton, Ont., after a two-year battle with cancer at his home in Brampton, Ont. He was 39.

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




